I. Is it a crime to be poor?

Dear Colleagues

During recent years I've exchanged views & info with you on the theme of the (ab)use of the criminal justice system to punish the poor (see attached articles). Whether it's imprisoning the mother who shoplifted baby formula and nappies (as we found in our research - Lucy Baldwin of De Montfort University and myself, see article attached) or those (305 people last year, up from 105 in 2017) who could not pay their council tax, or those who couldn't afford expensive private education and for their children with SEN who were too fearful to go to school (see below), let alone the hundreds sentenced each year for begging and sleeping rough, it is the old story of being punished for being poor. You may have seen the new campaigns to repeal the Vagrancy Act (<https://www.crisis.org.uk/get-involved/campaign/scrap-the-vagrancy-act/>) and to repeal the sanction of imprisonment for council tax debt in England, as has been done in Wales.

This leads me to propose a one day meeting of academics, prison reformers and campaigners on the theme: *Is it a crime to be poor?*

The aim would be to share knowledge and research, and to discuss how we as academics and reformers can act to end this endemic abuse of the criminal justice system. My research has been funded by The Oakdale Trust (Cadbury family) and I think they could be approached to fund such an event. I would be very happy to do so, if there is interest in this idea.

My most recent research is on the prosecution of parents (often ill, or disabled, poor and vulnerable) whose children have special educational needs and who are not able to attend school regularly. The parents are threatened with fines, or are fined, even given prison sentences -- a cruel and discriminatory (ab)use of the cjs. 27, 000 prosecutions last year.

II. Spain's second-largest bank BBVA charged with bribery, disclosure of secrets and corruption

BBVA stands accused of spying on officials of a construction company that sought to take control of the bank in 2004. Nine former or current managers at the bank are under investigation.

The bank says its imputation does not mean "formal accusation for any crime" 😊

Spain's National Court has charged Banco Bilbao Vizcaya Argentaria (BBVA) with "corruption and breach of confidence," a court spokesman said on Monday. Anti-corruption prosecutors had referred the case to the high court five days earlier.

BBVA is Spain's second-largest bank, with a strong presence in Latin America and the south eastern United States. In Mexico, its subsidiary Bancomer is the largest financial institution in the country.

The bank is suspected of contracting disgraced former police chief Jose Manuel Villarejo to illegally tap the phones of journalists, politicians and businesspeople in 2004.

Villarejo, who has been in jail since 2017, is suspected of having carried out blackmail, threats and wiretapping, on behalf of companies or rich individuals for decades, through his business intelligence firm Cenyt.

Spanish media reported that BBVA had hired Villarejo's firm, Cenyt, to investigate officials belonging to the construction company Sacyr, as part of BBVA's efforts to stop Sacyr's unsuccessful bid to take over the bank in 2004.

Villarejo invoiced more than 500,000€ between 2004 and 2005 in exchange for reports that included the monitoring of more than 4,000 telephones and spying journalists, businessmen and politicians including the then Minister of Industry.

BBVA ultimately admitted to having used the services Cenyt. But the bank has denied any wrongdoing and said an internal investigation is underway.

In a statement, BBVA's Executive Chairman Carlos Torres stressed the company's "firm commitment to clarifying the facts and complying with the law."

Nonetheless, nine former or current managers at the bank are under formal investigation in the case. Some BBVA executives have also been accused of receiving gifts from Cenyt in exchange for awarding contracts.

Francisco Gonzalez, who as executive chairman of BBVA was its top leader, resigned from all his posts, including honorary ones, on March 2019, as a result of the probe.

III. Barcelona's 'top manta' street vendors feel 'betrayed' by city council

With the new police crackdown on illegal selling, spokesman says sellers have no alternative and calls on mayor to "remember her promises"

Barcelona's 'top manta' street sellers feel "betrayed" by the city council, says one of their representatives, after the local authority launched special police patrols in key areas of the city to discourage the vendors from illegally selling their wares.

Aziz Fayé, the spokesman for the Popular Union of Street Sellers, told the Catalan News Agency that before the May local election the candidates for council positions promised to do "everything possible to resolve the issue positively with **social projects**".

Since Monday, a hundred officers from three different police forces have patrolled areas of Barcelona where the 'top manta' sellers normally congregate as part of a ["permanent" operation to "eradicate" the illegal practice.](#)

Yet the sellers, who get their name from the Catalan word for blanket ('manta') in reference to the coverings the vendors place on the ground to display their wares that can be quickly collected when the police appear, **remain defiant.**

The street sellers have announced they are holding a **demonstration** against the **"institutional racism"** of the city council for Friday at 18:30.

The union calls for the protest "against the **criminalization** and repression" of the group, and questions the permanent police operation against them, describing it as **"persecution and repression."**

The protest will take place at the Canaletes fountain on La Rambla, near Plaça Catalunya.

"We will continue selling on the streets whatever happens, if they want to kill us then they will kill us, but this is our life, our dignity, no one will remove us"

Arguing that selling illegally on the streets is "the only option" they have "to survive," Fayé says: "We will continue selling on the streets whatever happens, if they want to kill us then they will kill us, but this is our life, our dignity, no one will remove us."

In fact, on the first two days of the new police patrols, which last from 9.30am to 10pm, some of the city's 'top manta' sellers [set up shop in places near Barcelona's seafront after the officers had retired for the day.](#)

"We want to work with dignity", says spokesman

Insisting that the sellers - generally immigrants with few resources - have little alternative for making a living, Fayé asked: "Do they want us to steal from supermarkets, beg for money, resort to crime? We don't want that, we want to work with dignity."

Criticizing **Ada Colau's "change of attitude,"** the spokesman for the street sellers called on Barcelona's left-wing mayor "to remember her promises and to stop acting as if she belonged to the far right."

Referencing plans discussed to create work opportunities and a cooperative for the sellers, Fayé insists that this type of approach is "the only way to resolve this situation, not sending in police or trying to generate fear so that people stay at home".

IV. Several detainees of independentist groups in an operation of the Mossos/ Diversos detinguts de col·lectius independentistes en una operació dels Mossos

The Mossos d'Esquadra (*Catalan Police*) have detained several members of independentist groups such as Arran and the Union of Students of the Catalan Countries (*Sindicat d'Estudiants dels Països Catalans - SEPC*) under an operation that is still open at this time. Sources from the CUP have explained that arrests would be related to different causes, although they still do not have all the details. The Mossos d'Esquadra confirm that the operation is due to an investigation, but they do not specify if there are any arrests, nor the scope and the reasons for the operation. Several groups have called for a demonstration at 1:00pm by Les Corts police station.

Arran Sant Andreu has informed that a militant of his assembly was detained on Wednesday morning in his house, and the Mossos d'Esquadra took him to the police station "because of his political work in the neighborhood".

Els Mossos d'Esquadra han detingut diversos membres de col·lectius independentistes com Arran i el Sindicat d'Estudiants dels Països Catalans (SEPC) en una operació dels Mossos d'Esquadra que en aquestes moments continua oberta. Fonts de la CUP han explicat que les detencions estarien relacionades amb causes diferents, tot i que encara no disposen de tots els detalls. Els Mossos d'Esquadra confirmen que hi ha un dispositiu en marxa fruit d'una investigació, però sense concretar si hi ha detencions ni l'abast ni els motius de l'operació. Diversos col·lectius han convocat una concentració a les 13.00 hores davant de la comissaria de les Corts.

Arran Sant Andreu ha informat que un militant de la seva assemblea ha estat detingut aquest dimecres al matí a casa seva i se l'han endut a la comissaria "per la tasca política que fa al barri".
